

Early Childhood Education

The Early Childhood Education Program provides a safe space for both caregivers and children to learn and grow. In the past year we have focused on child-directed learning and developing our programming based on the interests of our members. Our programming has provided opportunities for each child to learn and make sense of the world at their own capacity surrounded by fun! The curriculum was designed to help the development of gross-motor and finemotor skills, social, emotional and creative development alongside child/ caregiver bonding.

In September, we collaborated with the Verdun Circus School where 11 families had the opportunity to attend a weekly session for 10 weeks to explore circus arts through various motor skills activities.

We offered two new programs this year: Art Attack and Zumbini. Returning program activities included baby massage, Karibou, respite and Saturday Program respite.





Age specific programming was provided through child-directed activities during open room play where children brought their own interest to the group to express what they are observing and learning in the world. Some favorites included construction, shopping, cooking and vehicles. Both children and their caregivers have expressed their LOVE for open room play, as it provides the opportunity to connect with others in a safe and inclusive environment, while children are also working on their social/ emotional development. We are proud of the work we accomplished this year and we look forward to another year of growth and connection!

Children's Programs

The children's programs are where the fun is! Each elementary school aged child is seen, heard, and engaged in activities that are based on their interests. Separated into three distinct departments; Day camps, After-School and Saturday Program, we were able to provide 163 families quality programs this year.

From Jumpstart to Power Up, our after-school program provided engaging activities that encouraged the global development of each child. We ended the 2021-2022 school year strong and said "goodbye" to 5 grade 6 children who were about to enter high school and transition into the youth programs.





In the summer months you could find us in the parks, swimming at the Natatorium and if it was a Wednesday we were more than likely on an outing exploring the city. Thanks to President's Choice Children's Charity, every child was provided breakfast and afternoon snack each day. Some highlights from Summer Camp 2022 include: 85 children enrolled each week, 7 outings, 20 pool days, 8 theme days, 370 program hours and lots of fun!

The after-school program relaunched in October 2023 with a solid team of 18 animators and 10 interns from Dawson College, Concordia University and McGill University. The Saturday program is one of Verdun's hidden gems where children can come and play with their friends in a less structured environment for 3.5 hours. We ended the fiscal year with Spring Camp that provided 5 days of non-stop fun for 44 members.

I can't afford it, so shout out to the Youth Programs for giving us these opportunities and making them free for all of us!" --- Kris, 17 year-old youth member The objectives of the Youth Programs are intentionally adapted to meet the changing needs of the community and population that we serve. We aim to continuously improve our youth social impact by prioritizing youth engagement and community care. We put young people at the heart of our decision-making, we build and work in partnership and promote innovation.

2022-2023 Program highlights:

- Built a new Youth Council with young leaders in the making;
- Facilitated impactful individual and group discussions on mental health issues affecting teens, young adults and young staff through specialized activities like podcasts, music and self-defense;
- Hosted an event celebrating young girls, young women and young femme, nonbinary folks with Project 10 (a new community partner) for International Women's Day;
- Created new partnerships with organizations and mental health professionals;
- Strengthend our partnership with Beurling Academy and collaborated on a few outreach projects like the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation event.



Seniors 50+

The Seniors Program provides social, educational and recreational programs and services to members of our community over the age of 50. This year, 110 senior members took part in our programs and services.

Our programs are designed to help keep seniors active, both physically and mentally. Moreover, the program strives to instill a sense of belonging among seniors while breaking down social isolation and enhancing overall health and well-being.

In November 2022 a survey was conducted among members of our fitness classes to gain a better understanding of their programming wishes. This process lead to the creation of a Seniors Committee in February 2023 to develop an action plan based on the ideas collected from the survey. We are happy to share that as a result of this process, two new activities were launched this year for seniors: Toning and Pickle-Ball!



110 senior members

- 98 tax returns completed
- 22 recreational activities offered
- 322 hours of physical fitness programming

In October, a group of local artists and a teacher offered Drum Classes to a dozen seniors. This was a huge success that was both educational and fun!

This year, we had the opportunity to partner with Riverview Elementary School for a special intergenerational project through the school's Community Learning Centre. Thirty children interviewed seven seniors on the theme of belonging to Verdun. It was a wonderful exchange as the seniors were delighted to represent their community and share their experiences with the next generation.



Food & Sustainability

This year, the Food & Sustainability Department's objective was to collaborate with other Verdun organizations involved in urban agriculture and food security initiatives, with the goal of responding to the needs of the most vulnerable members of our community.

Highlights include:

- Continuation and expansion of food production and food recuperation activities through our partnerships with the Verdun Food Circuit and Grand Potager;
- Facilitating Mobile Markets in HLMS (low-income housing for seniors) to ensure that vulnerable and low-mobility seniors have access to fresh, healthy food;
- Production and distribution of pre-made frozen meals at below market prices;
- Launching a new garden site at the Centre de formation Professionnelle de Verdun (CFPV);
- Collaborating with 7 community organizations;
- Providing an average of 65 food baskets each week through our food bank.

This past year Moisson Montreal provided us with 46,000 kg of food representing a value of \$314,318!

- 136 individuals served each week
 - 280 holiday food baskets provided

- 293 meals prepared each month
- 1 new garden site


